## 1. CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

### Introduction

Once again it is my pleasure to introduce another Annual Report for a year which has seen both great achievements and bitter disappointments.

A year in which we have kept our financial expenditure within budget and thanks to frugal budgeting the precept for the coming year is only marginally higher than last year. Our Responsible Financial Officer, Councillor P Ford, is to be congratulated on his tireless efforts maintaining close fiscal control of the Council's activities.

The work of the Council is mainly undertaken through a number of working groups and committees and on the following pages are reports from the leaders and chairman of these. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the leaders and chairman and their members for the tremendous effort they make on behalf of the community of Metheringham.

If you need more information on the work of these groups do not hesitate to make contact with the relevant person.

Some of the specific issues the Council have been working on are briefly discussed below.

#### 1.1 Quality Status

Over the last few years we have been working to update Council procedures and bring them in line with the best possible practice. At the same time our Clerk has been studying very hard to become qualified and now holds the Certificate in Local Council Administration and is an Associate Member of the Institute of Local Council Management.

In recognition of this work, in October the Accreditation Panel for the Quality Parish Scheme awarded Metheringham Parish Council, quality status. This confirms that the Council meets at least the minimum standards set for parish and town councils across the country. The Council must maintain the standards and criteria set for quality status and in four years time will need to apply for reaccreditation.

#### 1.2 Playing Fields

Sadly the plans outlined in last year's Annual Report have not yet come to fruition. The Council were advised by our Solicitor not to agree to a long term lease with the County Council relating to School use of the Star and Garter Field. The County Council refuse to accept alternative proposals and this issue remains unresolved.

The Parish Council are committed to finding a solution in keeping with the needs of the village and at the same time providing a safe and secure playing field for the children of Metheringham Primary School.

### 1.3 New Changing rooms

Clearly our changing rooms and toilet facilities on the playing fields are not adequate. The facilities at the swimming pool are also well below current standards.

Various options are being considered to resolve this problem but the failure to reach a satisfactory solution with the County Council over land issues is a major stumbling block.

Two options are currently being considered. One is to locate new facilities at the far end of the field with access from Princess Margaret Avenue and the other is to build on the Star and Garter Field. Both options would require new facilities to be developed at the swimming pool.

### 1.4 Village Cross

The new village cross now stands proudly in the centre of the village. Built to a Parish Council design, a replica of the pre-war cross, it was jointly funded by European Union money, together with grants from the County, District, Parish Councils and MACLA.

Unfortunately the 'street furniture' in front of the Library, paid for by the same fund, fails to reach the standards required in the centre of Metheringham.

### 1.5 Allotments

Efforts to purchase land for use as allotments has so far failed, but the Parish Council will continue its efforts to provide allotments to the growing number of residents on the waiting list.

### 1.6 The Spring

Work on the spring garden is now complete and we hope to have the area open again in the near future. The spring is a little known area adjacent to Drury Street.

At one time there were a number of springs in Metheringham and they formed a vital part of village life. This area is an important link to the heritage of the village.

### 1.7 Remembrance Sunday

The Parish Remembrance Sunday services were well attended. Those who paid the ultimate sacrifice in two world wars were not forgotten.

## 1.8 Christmas Tree

We again had a Christmas tree in the Memorial Gardens during the run up to the Christmas festivities. Together with the illuminated war memorial this adds a welcome sight during the dark days of December.

## 1.9 Parish Plan

A steering group has now been formed to move forward with a parish plan. Hopefully the group will look to the future of Metheringham and develop ideas to enhance village life in the years ahead.

## 1.10 Youth Council

We have yet to move forward with our plans for a youth council to mirror the work of the Parish Council. This project is still high on our list of action items and we continue to review various options to move this project forward.

## 1.11 Helping the Village Keep Fit

Outdoor exercise equipment for adults is shortly to be installed adjacent to the car park on Prince's Street. If you have a few minutes to spare why not go along and try out this new venture.

Parents and grandparents can have a go while the children play on the play park. Let us know what you think about the facilities. If they are a success we could consider further installations.

## **2. REPORTS FROM WORKING GROUPS AND COMMITTEES**

### **2.1 Children's Playgrounds and Playing Fields**

For some time now the Parish Council have been mindful of the need to re-vamp and upgrade both play areas and a programme has been formulated to achieve this. This has started with a serious amount of work on the general maintenance and the aesthetics which is now well underway and already starting to make a difference.

The next stage is to replace any damaged or previously removed play equipment. At the Special Council Meeting in March 2010 it was approved to purchase new children's play equipment for both play areas. The new equipment has been ordered and should be installed very, very soon, if not already. In addition the Parish Council has gone that extra mile and included three items of 'Adult Exercise' equipment, i.e. Double Air Walker, Air Skier and Elliptical X Trainer which will be installed adjacent to the children's play area at Prince's Street. This programme will have a huge impact on updating both play areas.

I would like to thank my colleagues on the working group, also my thanks to the members of the Parish Council for their support in this project.

### **2.2 Fayre and Feast**

Preparations are now underway towards the villages annual Fayre and Feast which is planned for Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> October, with a theme of 'Heroes and Heroines' (which is a wide choice from; Nelson Mandela to Superman and should appeal to all factions).

We are hoping to encourage participating groups to have their stalls stay open for longer than in the past and extend their ending time towards the closing time of 9.00pm. We are also hoping that participants will move away from the traditional tombola stalls to give a wider appeal to the visitor and a more varied chance of participation.

There will be a central stage and we are contacting a number of new entertainers and hope to encourage more new local talent to take part.

A new source of stands have been booked locally which should help considerably with the logistics of setting up and break down whilst contact with local authorities and police are being undertaken to ensure a safe and trouble free event will be enjoyed by all.

## 2.3 Highways, Footpaths and Car Parks

Many of the issues, major projects raised in 2008/2009 have been completed, but several still remain outstanding eg footpath down Lincoln Road. A meeting was held with the Lincolnshire County Council (LCC) Highways Department in October last year, a number of issues were discussed, but as yet still have not been resolved, including certain County policy issues such as white lining at the side of roads without kerbs. Others related to bus stops and bus shelters; various works are scheduled for the Princes Street, Princess Margaret Avenue area, including drop kerbs and pavement improvements.

The recent cold weather has led to icy roads and pavements and as a consequence pot holes have blighted our local roads. Some remedial works have already taken place but please advise the Parish Clerk Tel No: 0800 6343307 of any continuing problems. In addition a request for additional grit bins has been made to LCC.

### Footpaths

A right of way gives the public a legal right to pass through a piece of land in the form of footpaths, bridleways or byways. The parish area contains a large number of such 'rights of way', including four that cross the railway and the council is aware that Network Rail have a national policy to close as many as is possible as remain on their network. The Council have requested more detailed information from LCC (as Footpaths Authority) with regard to those four crossings which may either be diverted or closed as a result of the upgrading of the railway line.

### Bus Stops and Shelters

Following the realignment of the bus stops outside the Co-op and the Methodist Chapel, a number of meetings have been held with representatives of LCC, Co-op, Royal Mail and Parish Council with regard to placing a bus shelter outside the Co-op store. The Co-op have applied for planning permission to alter the shop frontage and entrance, but this and the proposed bus shelter are dependent on the post box being moved from its present site to the area outside the pharmacy.

Additionally it is proposed that a bus stop column be placed near to D & K News. This will involve widening the pavement between Drury Street to the shop, so that there is space for queuing and for pedestrians.

### Railway Station

LCC asked the Parish Council to comment on the consultation document 'Lincolnshire County Rail Strategy' and duly responded. Whilst generally accepting the proposals for Metheringham railway station, concerns were voiced with regard to the vandalized and derelict buildings, the state of the car park, the general unkempt environment and the lack of evening and Sunday rail services, issues that date back to 2005.

We noted the policy with regard to footpaths crossing rail lines (see above) and a copy of the Parish Council response was made available at Info-Links for individual comment and response to LCC.

### Signage

Towards the end of last year the Council purchased and installed two signs to indicate from the High Street/Middle Street, the Village Hall and Car Park and a further sign was located at the car park entrance. LCC have been asked to provide a Village Hall sign at the lower end of the High Street/Drury Street pointing up Middle Street. This is still awaited.

### Car Parks

Concerns have been expressed at the way in which after heavy rainfall the village hall car park is subject to lying water in certain areas. Remedial work is intended to take place when planned alterations are made to the 'new' main entrance to the hall and adjoining area.

## 2.4 Risk Assessment

The greatest risk facing a parish council is being unable to deliver the service and / or activities expected of that council.

Metheringham Parish Council prides itself in the fact that, by virtue of receiving Quality Status in the last few months, it has been identified that we do deliver this service.

To ensure that we are always in 'control' the Risk Assessment Working Group has met regularly during the last financial year to assess the risks that we may face and we have satisfied ourselves that we are taking adequate steps to minimize them.

To conduct this assessment the following points are addressed:-

- (a) identifying areas which require reviews
- (b) identify what the risk might be
- (c) evaluate the management and control of the risk and record all findings
- (d) review, assess and revise as and if required.

An example of this is that, at the present time, the Parish Council is undergoing a professional, detailed review of all parish assets.

Should anyone wish to view a copy of the Parish Council Risk Assessment Report they can make arrangements via the Clerk.

## 2.5 Street Lighting

There have been few problems with the street lighting in the past year with all problems being dealt with in a reasonable time frame.

There have been four locations identified where additional or modified lighting has been requested.

1. At the access between the co-op car park and Townsend Way where there has been a number of incidents of anti-social activity reported.
2. The junction of Lincoln Road (B1189) and Sleaford Road (B1188), there have been two collisions, (albeit not of a serious nature) and a number of near misses.
3. The junction of Station Road and High Street (near the petrol station)
4. The High Street

We are at the stage where we will soon need to make an overall review of all street lighting in the village. Regard must also be given to environmental issues and the increasing cost of energy supplies.

Some of the village newer estates are very well lit with coverage from dusk until dawn, however many of these roads are rarely used during the hours of darkness. Indeed the worst street in regard to lighting levels is Lincoln Road and this is the busiest thoroughfare in the village!

There will be concerns about safety and security which will need to be addressed and full consultation with both the general public and the local police etc. will be essential before any decision is made.

## 2.6 Planning Committee

The Planning Committee meet in the Church Hall on the second Wednesday of each month. Prior to the official start of the meeting at 7.30pm a public forum is held between 7.15pm and 7.30pm, if required. It is at this point that members of the public may address the meeting on current matters.

In December 2009 we were given a presentation by Roy Pell, Rural Housing Enabler from Community Lincs, outlining the “Call for Land” process. This followed from the responses received on completion of a questionnaire on the need for affordable housing in Metheringham. Roy Pell subsequently made the “Call for Land” through various channels, but to date we have not received any results of that call.

All planning applications relating to Metheringham Parish can be viewed at Info-Links on the High Street in the village, or at the offices of North Kesteven District Council in Sleaford. They can also be viewed on their website and comments made online. If informed, the Planning Committee will take into account the opinions, comments and objections of any interested parties, and feed them back to the Planning Department of North Kesteven District Council.

Occasionally no planning applications are made in time for the monthly meeting, and a notice to this effect will be displayed in the notice board by the War Memorial. Similarly posters are displayed here, with information on what applications will be discussed at forthcoming meetings, to give interested parties the opportunity to attend.

## 2.7 War Memorial and Spring


The maintenance of the War Memorial and Spring has been managed by the village gardener/handyman Paul Chambers and are now a pleasure to view.

## 2.9 Metheringham Village Hall Management Committee

After such a busy time as reported in the last Annual Report, the past twelve months have been relatively quiet. The hall is still used for many village activities, and we thank you for your continued support.

Sadly our hardworking manager and booking person, John and Anne Harrison, have decided they would like to enjoy John's retirement to the full, so it was with regret that the committee accepted their resignation. A small gift was given at the meeting held in March, but this is but a token of our gratitude for all they have done. Carol Knox, our wonderful cleaner, has recently had to take time off, following a fracture to her wrist. We apologise to any of our users if the hall has not been up to its usual state of cleanliness and hopefully, by the time of the meeting, Carol will have made a full recovery. My grateful thanks must also go to Cliff Tompkins, secretary, and Gwyneth Holland, treasurer, and to the rest of the committee for their support.

At the Christmas Party, held in the hall in December 2009, the presentation of a commemorative plaque was made by Lincolnshire County Council and North Kesteven District Council, and is now displayed in the small hall alongside a plaque from the Lottery Fund. All these bodies were instrumental in giving grants for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Energy Efficiency Improvements project.

The floor in the main hall was completely refurbished in the year, with several bags of dirt and old polish being removed from the surface and a new finish being applied. Whilst we are mindful that this is only a floor, it would be appreciated if users of the hall can remember to carry chairs and tables, and not drag them across the floor.

Indoor Curling has been a great success, held mostly on Friday evenings. This has attracted a welcome grant from the Co-op, and we can now afford to purchase our own equipment. A sound system has also been purchased, for use in the hall. The Spring Fayre held last year was a success, and we are holding one again this year on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> May. A 50/50 auction raised much-needed funds, and a star event last year was the Craft Exhibition Day.

We are hoping this year will see the fruition of the future plans as mentioned in last year's report, and apologise to all who had hoped to see them up and running before now. It may be worth pointing out that, apart from the manager/caretaker/booking officer and cleaner, the rest of the committee are volunteers already highly involved in their own organisations.

#### 2.10 Metheringham and District Swimming Pool Association

We welcomed Mike Reynolds onto the committee as the Parish Council representative. He has been a very useful ally in the fight against giant conifers and has a wealth of general knowledge that we can draw upon.

We are very grateful to the Parish Council for their continued support. At the start of the season they gave the services of the village handyman, Paul Chambers who re-laid the slabs alongside the changing rooms. They paid for one committee member to attend a pool operating course at North Somercotes with the Association paying for one other. We have asked them to buy our chemicals in bulk for the 2010 season which will last two years.

Committee members have also attended many other courses eg. fundraising, first aid, management training and the vetting and barring scheme (CRB checks). At the present time I am preparing documents and updating others that would enable the Association to acquire 'Clubmark Status' for the services it provides to its users. The appraisal and Development Plan 1994 has been updated with our aims for the next five and ten years.

The maintenance costs of running the swimming pool on behalf of the village continue to rise and although the attendance figures have increased year on year, it is not enough to cover these costs. Fundraising is imperative but this year the village did not support us, many events had to be cancelled. We are loathed to increase the cost of using the pool as most of our customers are children.

We would like to say thank you to the few who have helped throughout the season, Paul, Malcolm and Karen, Andrew and Sophia and I would like to thank the committee of Anne, Dawn and Shirley, and that is the crunch of the matter! There are four of us and Mike.

We desperately need new committee members and more volunteers or the pool will close. If we can share the maintenance and operational tasks between many, then no-one feels put upon.

The pool has to carry on. We are so lucky to have this wonderful facility in our village.

### 3.2 Supporting Statement for Year Closing 31/03/2010

#### **Balance Brought Forward**

On 31/03/2009, at the end of the 2008/2009 financial year, this Parish Council carried forward **£80,384.00** into 2009/2010.

#### **Precept (2009/2010)**

The requested Precept, made to North Kesteven District Council for the financial year 2009/2010 was **£80,000.00**. This was approved and paid in two instalments (April and September).

#### **Total Other Receipts During 2009/2010**

The total other receipts during the financial year 2009/2010 were **£17,975.00** (in 2009/2010 these were £32,274.00 - a variance of £14,302.00).

**Total income for financial year totalled £178,359.00**

The main reasons for the variances were:

- (a) Interest on monies held was £58.00 (in 2008/2009 was £1,109.00)
- (b) Metheringham Village Hall had no upgrading work (in 2008/2009 they made a contribution of £14,352.00 for such work)

#### **Borrowings**

This Parish Council had no borrowings during financial year 2009/2010.

#### **Outstanding Debtors**

At the 31<sup>st</sup> March 2010 this Council had 3 debtors with a debt of £6,535.00 outstanding:

#### **Assets**

During this financial year this Parish Council had the Assets professionally valued by a Chartered Surveyor. This has seen a substantial rise in the value of Council assets with them now being valued at £3,615,000.00 (previously valued at £2,234,585.00 by self assessment). Documentation is available from the Chartered surveyor to substantiate these new valuations.

NB. On 31<sup>st</sup> March 2010 this Council had no fixed assets (other than land values) valued at over £1,000.00 per item.

### **Staffing Costs (Incl. N/I & Tax)**

The staffing costs (incl. Pension, N/I & Tax) for the financial year 2009/2010 totalled £27,270.00 - a variance of £3,945.00 on year 2008/2009 (where the figure was £23,325.00). This was due in the main to:

- (a) General salary increases for all employees (£16,643.00 in 2008/09) £19,109.00 in 2009/2010.
- (b) Clerk Pension Scheme increase (£3,005.00 in 2008/2009) £3,613.00 in 2009/2010.
- (c) Tax / National Insurance increase (£3,677.00 in 2008/2009) £4,548.00 in 2009/2010.

### **S137 Payments**

The payments made this year totalled £8,420.00 (a variance of £4,420.00) (in 2008/2009 - £4,000.00). This was due in the main to an agreed £5,000.00 contribution towards replacing the village 'Cross'.

### **Total Other Payments**

The total other payments by this Council during 2009/2010 totalled £51,750.00. This sees a variance of £40,668.00 on year 2008/2009 when it was £92,418.00.

The variances were due in the main to the following reasons:

- (a) Village Car Park, Princes Street - surfaced – Costing £19,529.00
- (b) The Village Hall (A Parish Council Asset) had ECO Friendly work carried out on premises, costing £15,000.00.
- (c) Plans produced for proposed Pavilion / Dressing Room project – Costing £2,000.00
- (d) £4,000.00 Cluster Group monies passed through this Council's books

### **Agency Work**

This Council undertook no agency work during 2009/2010 and has not identified any such works for the forthcoming financial year.

### **Pensions**

This Council paid an employer's contribution of 19.3% of the Clerk's pensionable pay to the Local Government Pension scheme amounting to £3,613.00.

### **Advertising and Publicity**

In the financial year this Council:

- (a) published and distributed the Annual Report to all households in the Parish
- (b) in conjunction with the local community leisure association, contributed towards a quarterly community magazine, distributed in and around the parish and neighbouring parishes
- (c) maintained links with local community leisure association website - [www.macla.co.uk](http://www.macla.co.uk)

### **Tenancies**

This Parish Council, as the Landlords, have four Allotments on Dunston Road. These are rented out on a yearly basis (December to November) at a cost of £20.00 per allotment. Presently these all have tenants.

### **Management Committees**

The Village Hall, Bowls Club and Swimming Pool, which are all part of the Parish Assets, are run in their entirety by separate Management Committees, under the auspices of this Parish Council.

The Parish Council does however accept its responsibilities in assisting in the upkeep and insuring of these facilities which is now placing a much heavier burden on the Council's finances.

### **Sum to be Carried Forward to 2010/2011**

At 31<sup>st</sup> March 2010 this Council will bring forward £99,335.53 as a working balance.
